
The End Is the Beginning Sermon by Pastor John

Our new pastor, Rev. Dr. Marion Ryan Hubbard



As of July 1, our new pastor will be Rev. Dr. Marion Ryan Hubbard. She had previously served with us back in 2021 for 4 months while Rev. Beckford was on leave. Listed below is her biographical information

Rev. Dr. Marion Ryan Hubbard is a member of the New York Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church with 20 years of service in parish ministry as an ordained Elder. She has served as a pastor to seven churches in the New York Annual Conference. She earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology from Post

University. She also holds a Master's of Divinity and a Doctor of Ministry degree from Drew University. Her doctorate dissertation was "A Guide to a Faith-Based Support Group for Adults Who Personally Experienced Childhood Trauma."

Marion has done extensive work in ministry in Ghana, Africa. In her ten years of service to the Ghanaian people, she was a co-founder of the Project Dorcas Medical Clinic in the north of Ghana in Tamale, bringing much-needed medical assistance to the wonderful people of the rural Yapalla Village and surrounding areas. She has also been a part of the Kairos International prison ministry team serving over 10 years in the Connecticut prison system.

Being a New Yorker, born and raised with a love of adventure, has taken her on many exciting journeys with God at her side. She has traveled to many states across the U.S. and around the world including Korea, China, India, Turkey, Jerusalem, Germany, the Czech Republic, England, Ireland, and Scotland.

In 1981, Marion became a single mom and left New York City with her three children and settled in Bethel, CT. As God would have it, twelve years later, the love of her life appeared, and she married for a second time to a wonderful man, Robert Hubbard. Between them, they have ten children and twenty-one grandchildren. They were married for 31 wonderful years until Bob's passing this past January from Dementia. In 2018, Marion retired from active ministry at the New York Annual Conference to take care of her husband who developed dementia. For the past six years, they have lived in Tequesta, FL, and attended First United Methodist of Jupiter, FL. She has been active in her local United Methodist church, serving wherever needed, preaching on occasion, visiting the shut-ins, and running Bible studies and support groups during the year. She is currently working part-time as a Counselor for Community Christian Counseling Center.

March 2024

Wendy and I just returned from two weeks in Ft Myers and Punta Gorda, working with two college disaster recovery teams. During that time we also had the opportunity to meet with David Draeger, the Mission Volunteer Coordinator for the Methodist Church of Haiti, and Molly McEntire, the Florida Conference Director of Missions at the Conference Center. David has been in the States for the past six weeks visiting family, churches, and other supporters of mission work in Haiti. Unknown to David at that time, his flight out of Port au Prince was one of the last commercial flights departing as gang activity has shut down the airport.

In one sense we are running out of words to describe the situation in Haiti. In summary, gang activity has now moved from the greater PAP area to rural communities to the more affluent areas of Petionville, Laboule and Thomassin. Just several days ago, more than 10 persons were murdered in Thomassin. For those who have been to Furcy, Petionville is where the Methodist Guest House is located and the others are two areas we pass on the way to up the mountain to Furcy.

While at the Conference Center, David made a short video which has been posted on the Florida Conference website. He describes the situation in Haiti, the work of the church, the challenges the people face, and a request for prayers and assistance. Here is the link to that video: <u>https://</u> <u>vimeo.com/923152367/b7bb63c999?share=copy</u> Gangs have effectively shut down the economy. Major roads are blocked, farmers are extorted for payment, ports are under gang control, and the main airport is closed. Food access is difficult, expensive; gangs have looted food-aid stations, and millions are now considered having moved from "food-insecure" to a "famine-like" situation. Mass starvation is a concern both in urban and rural areas.

Aid-organizations are trying to find alternative ways of getting food to people. In some areas, gangs have offered days of "truce" which allow people to do what shopping they can, and for food to get through. One interesting scenario is, the Methodist Church at College Bird in Port au Prince has been given a reprieve to provide meals on Sundays following worship. According to David some 400+ meals have been provided each Sunday to local residents during this time. How long this will last no one knows. The whole situation is so tenuous.

What can we do? Mountains of Hope is seeking to work with several other organizations to provide emergency supplies. Earlier this month we received funds to provide seed and fertilizer to the Farmer's Association. We are hoping to provide emergency rice and beans to community members as well to supplement what the farmer's grow. Smyrna UMC in eastern North Carolina has offered \$1000 to help initiate this effort. We are grateful for their support.

Should I be concerned about mold in my home?

What is mold?

Molds are microscopic organisms that are found virtually everywhere, both indoors and outdoors. Molds are types of fungi that live on plants, foods, dry leaves, wood, and other organic materials

Can mold become a problem in my home?

Yes, mold needs moisture to thrive and multiply. Major sources of indoor moisture that can cause mold problems include:

- flooding
 backed-up sewers
 damp basements
 moisture from combustion appliances (furnace or
- plumbing leaks
 - stove)
 - excess moisture in kitchens and bathrooms due to poor or no ventilation
- humidifiers ice dams

leaky roofs

How am I exposed to indoor molds?

It is common to find mold spores in the air in Connecticut homes. Mold spores primarily cause health problems when they become airborne and are inhaled.

What are possible health effects?

Typical symptoms reported by individuals exposed to mold may include:

- breathing difficulties headaches · burning, reddened eyes
- asthma flare-ups
- dizziness
- nasal and sinus congestion
- dry, hacking cough
- sore throat
- shortness of breath skin irritation

Should I test my home for mold?

The Connecticut Department of Public Health (DPH) does not recommend testing as the first step to determine if you have a mold problem because there are no healthbased air standards for levels of mold indoors.

Air testing almost never affects the final recommendations. If you can see or smell mold or mildew, you have a moisture and mold problem.

The first step is to control the moisture and then clean and dry out the moldy area. Then it is important to identify the moisture source and correct it.

200th CELEBRATION CORNER



A New State Constitution Opens the Door to Religious Freedom

Connecticut adopted a new state constitution in 1818, which granted all people freedom to practice their own religions. As a result, new houses of worship were built to meet the rising need. On March 22, 1824, the trustees of the local Methodist Society purchased a quarter-acre plot with a dwelling at 130 Main Street from Charles Winslow for \$350. Our handwritten copy of the original legal document lists these trustees and charges them "to erect or build or cause to be erected or built thereon a house or place of worship for the use of the members of the Methodist Episcopal Church. . . and in further trust and confidence that they shall at all times and forever hereafter, permit such ministers and preachers belonging to said church as shall from time to time be duly authorized by the general conference. . .to preach and expound God's Holy Word therein."

In the Brief Historical Sketch of the Wethersfield M.E. Church, by the Rev. George Colburn, published in 1882, we learn:


"The site for the church having been secured, containing a small house for a parsonage, the cornerstone was laid with appropriate ceremonies, April 18, 1824. The timber was contributed by different ones, as was also the work of building. But notwithstanding, much of the labor was donated, there was a debt which proved a heavy burden to the society for a number of years.

"Their house was built and enclosed, though for a long time they were unable to finish it. Crude seats were formed by placing planks across the timbers, upon which the worshippers sat while their feet rested on the ground. Uninviting as this may have appeared, it was their place of worship, dear to them. There were heard their songs of praise, and their prayers, burdened with a deep solitude for souls, breathed forth from hearts burning with a Saviour's love, ascended heavenward and moved the throne. Gradually the building was completed, and the debt finally liquidated."

Adjusted for inflation dollars today, the debt was \$11,200.

We are grateful to Temple Beth Torah for graciously welcoming us to celebrate our beginnings in this house of worship sacred to Christianity and Judaism.



COUNCIL OF BISHOPS



"Blessed are the peacemakers for they shall be called the children of God" Matthew 5:9 (NLT)

As bishops of The United Methodist Church, we call for an immediate and permanent cease-fire in the conflict between Hamas and Israel in Gaza and pledge our prayers and commitment to work for a durable peace for Israelis, Palestinians, and all in the region.

As United Methodists, we join others in encouraging, "...diplomatic initiatives that will engage both Israelis and Palestinians in an effort to understand the fears, hopes, and aspirations of each other. Such strategies should actively seek a way to promote a just and lasting peace and cooperation that will lead to a two-State solution...an end to the current occupation and violence, and the creation of a viable Palestinian state living side by side in peace with Israel..."1

On October 7, 2023, an attack by Hamas left 1,200 Israelis dead and hundreds of hostages taken.

Since then, more than 30,000 have been killed by Israel's bombardment of Gaza, the majority of them women and children. Innocent people continue to be killed because of the fighting, and many are dying of hunger and the spread of infectious disease.

The ability of aid organizations to attend to the critical needs of the victims of this prolonged war has also been sharply limited by the lack of meaningful negotiations. On February 29, starving Palestinians were fired upon as they sought food from an aid truck, with more than 100 persons killed by Israeli forces.

It is estimated that 1.8 million Palestinians have been displaced, their homes and communities destroyed.

The United Nations estimates that more than half a million people are living under "catastrophic levels of deprivation and starvation."

We believe that the current military strategy of the Israeli government, supported by U.S. weapons transfers and aid, will only lead to the destruction of the entire Gaza Strip, an unconscionable death toll that grows daily, the perpetuation of one of the world's longest conflicts, and the proliferation of increased enmity between Israelis and Palestinians, which has historically led to an increase in the militarization on both sides There is no peace to be found in this strategy.


The lack of a true cease-fire after more than five months of this deadly conflict compels us to raise our voices now. We call for an immediate and permanent cease-fire in the Gaza Strip and a commitment from all involved parties, including Israel, Palestinians, surrounding Middle East countries, the U.S., and others to pursue a lasting peace.

We pledge our prayers and commitment to work for a durable peace, an end to the violence and the release of the hostages.

Wordly Women Spring Study: "When You Pray. . .A Study of Six Prayers in the Bible"

A Study on Prayer from Kelly Minter, Jackie Hill Perry, Jen Wilkin, Jennifer Rothschild, Jada Edwards, and Kristi McLelland

Do you have trouble thinking of words to say to God when you pray? Are you afraid some emotions are too intense to express to God? Do you reach the end of a day only to realize you haven't prayed at all? You're not alone. Prayer is the way we relate to God, but sometimes it's a struggle. Throughout God's Word, we encounter many voices who teach us how to pray.

In this 7-session study, join with six beloved Bible teachers who will help you study prayers in the Bible that can inspire your own. You'll learn that God welcomes your praise and lament, your thanksgiving and intercession. You'll see examples of how to pray when you're alone and when you're gathered with others. Above all, you'll notice there's no one right way to pray. As you draw near to God through prayer, you'll find your faith strengthened and your heart united to Christ.

All women of the church are invited to join the Wordly Women's Spring Study: "When You Pray...A Study of Six Prayers in the Bible." This is a 7-week video and workbook study. We will meet each Monday to view the video and for discussion, there is, also, homework to accomplish each week.
