



The last time I spoke to you I was so pleased with the support I was experiencing and what I was able to offer to those in need. **This has changed dramatically.** It's been difficult lately. No matter who you are, it's harder to make your dollars do as much as you need them to do. I understand that.

But I also try to understand what it's like to have to worry everyday about food. Have you seen anyone in the market with a large bag of rice in their cart and nothing else? Have you seen anyone in the dollar store with what appears to be only food for one day's meal in their arms?



Many of you know of the man in the black truck who frequents the Pantry – many feel he comes too often. Well, I've had several chats with him. He tells me he feels he is doing what we're doing – giving food to those who need it. He told me when he gives out food from the Pantry, the recipients make him feel like Santa Claus.

Although there are a few very faithful donors I can always depend on, most donors seem unable to continue donating and/or don't feel right doing so. I hate to think I'm not going to be able to play a small role in helping those who are in need of food. But truth be told, the future of the LFP is uncertain at this time.

I would like to suggest we provide just some basic food items such as:

Peanut butter, jam, crackers, soup, baked beans, mac and cheese

Dry cereal, tuna fish, pasta, sauce

Maybe by limiting our selections, it would help us determine if we are helping a number of people or just a few.

200th ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION CORNER

We Are the Church

Just like today, our church has always dealt with building maintenance, alterations and repairs. Reading through decades of church council meeting records and yearly charge conference reports might indicate that the first priority was physical and financial survival. However, my sense is evangelism, social outreach and nurturing one another in Christian love were at the heart of church life, just less debated and thus less documented. Our next series of articles will look at the activities of the numerous church groups that hummed in Christian service, as well as the dominant role of worship in our cherished building.



From our early days, individual groups, such as the Womens' Society of Christian Service, a Sunday School class, the Epsworth League or Men's club, assumed the hands-on working or financial responsibility for a specific project. A fallen tree or broken pipe could break the budget. Heating the church was often a challenge and money for coal a large budget item. A "roll call supper" in 1925 raised money to pay the coal bill, as did a whist party held by the Elder Young People's Council. Meetings and Sunday evening worship were occasionally held in members' homes to cut down on church fuel costs in the coldest months.

In reviewing meeting records for the first half of the 1900s, the following caught my interest:

- In 1913, William Boardman donated \$1,000 for the construction of a Sunday School addition. He was then active in South Methodist Church in Hartford (no longer a church but used today as the South Park Inn homeless shelter), but had grown up in town and attended our church Sunday School as a child.
- In 1919, the church council voted that the Rev. Thawley be authorized "to make arrangements to procure the 1,050-pound bell in the nearby Baptist Church for our church." That Baptist Church disbanded in 1922 and I found no further reports on how or if we even got that bell.
- The 100th anniversary of laying the cornerstone for our original church was celebrated with services on May 4, 1924. There was also a special musical program featuring the dedication of a new organ during that evening service. Coincidentally, our 200th Celebration Concert is on May 4, 2024. Programs for the 1924 anniversary events are posted on the hallway bulletin board near the Old Fellowship Hall.
- In 1929, records list 92 active members. On February 3, 1930, the Rev. Bergston reported he had "taken 50 into the church since last October and there was a need for a few more hymnals."
- In 1930, the Epsworth League paid G. Fox & Co. \$258 for new sanctuary carpeting.
- In 1933, records noted that a dead tree at the Marsh Street parsonage needed to be taken down and it would
 cost a great deal. It was decided to wait until the leaves were down in the fall, but "in a great hard windstorm
 Saturday evening in June, the wise hand of providence guided it down in such a way that very little damage
 was done."

- The October 10, 1934 meeting notes include "discussion and questions concerning a certain cow and noise during church services," and years later on July 2, 1941, the secretary was instructed "to ask Mr. James Anderson to keep his cow away from church property." (Perhaps cows are bothered by organ music.) To this day, Anderson Farms plants crops to the rear edge of 130 Main Street, but no longer has livestock to disturb Temple Beth Torah services.
- In 1936, changes were made to the sanctuary including a new Hammond electric organ and new lighting.
 Two plaques in our current narthex list names of members who donated to purchase that organ.
 In November of 1937, meeting notes record "dampness down in the church cellar and how the water settled there. After much discussion as to causes, the repair committee was asked to investigate." Records of our 2024 council meetings are very similar!
- In 1938, a new kitchen was added. The nearby prison, which had been located at today's Cove Park, provided labor to dig the trenches for the concrete.
- In 1939, reading these old records become easier with the change from handwritten to typed reports.
- In 1941, we are no longer part of a circuit, beginning the conference year as a "charge church." The Rev. Greene states "this parish presents an unusual field for service."

Rev. Dr. Marion Ryan Hubbard is a member of the New York Annual

Conference of the United Methodist Church with 20 years of service in parish ministry as an ordained Elder. She has served as a pastor to seven churches in the New York Annual Conference. She earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology from Post University. She also holds a Master's of Divinity and a Doctor of Ministry degree from Drew University. Her doctorate dissertation was "A Guide to a Faith-Based Support Group for Adults Who Personally Experienced Childhood Trauma."

Marion has done extensive work in ministry in Ghana, Africa. In her ten years of service to the Ghanaian people, she was a co-founder of the Project Dorcas Medical Clinic in the north of Ghana in Tamale, bringing much-needed medical assistance to the wonderful people of the rural Yapalla Village and surrounding areas. She has also been a part of the Kairos International prison ministry team serving over 10 years in the Connecticut prison system.

Being a New Yorker, born and raised with a love of adventure, has taken her on many exciting journeys with God at her side. She has traveled to many

states across the U.S. and around the world including Korea, China, India, Turkey, Jerusalem, Germany, the Czech Republic, England, Ireland, and Scotland.

In 1981, Marion became a single mom and left New York City with her three children and settled in Bethel, CT. As God would have it, twelve years later, of her life appeared, and she married for

a second time to a wonderful man, Robert Hubbard. Between them, they have ten children and twenty-one grandchildren. They were married for 31 wonderful years until Bob's passing this past January from Dementia. In 2018, Marion retired from active ministry at the New York Annual Conference to take care of her husband who developed dementia. For the past six years, they have lived in Tequesta, FL, and attended First United Methodist of Jupiter, FL. She has been active in her local United Methodist church, serving wherever needed, preaching on occasion, visiting the shut-ins, and running Bible studies and support groups during the year. She is currently working part-time as a Counselor for Community Christian Counseling Center.

Her mother always stated, "Going out with Marion is like going on an adventure; you never know where you will end up." Pastor Marion is so excited to be joining us again to continue the journey of bringing God's love to Wethersfield and beyond.


